From their info... "While there are many reasons for homelessness, one encouraging note is that the condition of homelessness is usually temporary. Almost 80% of people who fall homeless are able to find shelters, adequate affordable housing or other permanent residence within 3 months. Hospitality House was opened to help fill this need in October 2000.



People from the community came together with the help of twelve churches in the area to establish this shelter at Lake Burien Presbyterian Church for single women experiencing homelessness. Hospitality House's 90-day program lays the foundation for empowerment and success for a better future.

It all begins with meeting the basic needs of clients (residents) – a bed, a hot meal, and a safe, stable environment. Our home-like atmosphere combined with a new sense of security affords clients the opportunity to look beyond their current circumstances to

their future. Each client's objective is to find permanent housing and financial stability, but how this is achieved is based upon the needs of the individual. Case managers support clients throughout the program as we believe that case management is the underpinning of our client's future and an integral piece of our program. Our clients are given the tools and the blueprints necessary to build their own futures; we help to implement the pouring of the foundation."

I am always very proud of the efforts made by the members of this club. The events, life-saving schools, suggestions, donations... We are a great addition to the car community as well as the human community. I'm willing to bet you're all proud as well.





The large tent held around 350 people, all focused on the panelists up front. The drawing power of Pernilla Solberg, Becs Williams and Michele Mouton was outstanding. They shared fun stories of racing and the race industry bringing insight to the challenges and triumphs within their world.

When asked how one of the greatest rally drivers of all time got started at age 22, Michele Mouton replied about being a navigator; "I wasn't impressed by my driver and thought, it looks easy."

share stories and advice.

"We know the importance of this..." says Josie Rimmer, "every time a young person asks, 'Girls can do this too?"

We joined this event as a club with a drive and a group attendance. Karen James offered to lead the drive as we gathered on the chilly morning at a Starbucks in Issaquah. After gathering a few smiling familiar faces we headed to our cars around 9 AM and jumped onto I-90 for a quick 4 mile run east toward Preston. From there our 44 mile route twisted along the shore of the Raging River on its way to join the Snoqualmie River. At Fall City, we turned away from our destination so we could enjoy some of the great farm roads that

guide us across the valley floor before winding over a ridge or two, past Snoqualmie Falls, around the Mill Pond, and into DirtFish.



Wanting her to have a good chance to prove herself, Michele's father bought her a Renault Alpine and funded her first rally season. She did well and over a couple *(continued on page 6)*

years got the attention of Audi Sport, who signed her to their World Rally Championship team to drive the new Quattro for the 1981 season with Fabrizia Pons as navigator. Battling the cars, roads, and officials through the season, Michele drove to victory at the Rallye SanRemo marking the first



commentator. Pernilla Solberg grew up in Sweden where rally racing was huge. Motivated by Michele Mouton's success, and encouraged by her parents, she became a great driver, mechanic, and team manager. A second panel discussion included Michele Abbate, who races in

WRC win by a woman. After her taste of victory, she really focused on being the best. Not the best woman. Simply the best ever.

Audi Sport sat down with her to negotiate the next year's contract. The Audi rep said he didn't like to negotiate on money. "No need to negotiate. Simply double it," offered Michele, as she knew her value. The rep didn't argue.

By 1983, rallying entered the Group B era, the most dangerous time for rally racing thanks to the power (450bhp!) and speed the cars were capable of hitting. On dirt. Combine this with massive crowds and a lack of crowd control and you have a recipe for disaster, and Group B was eventually cancelled after several fatal accidents. Nevertheless, it produced some legendarily fearsome cars like the Renault R5 Turbo, Peugeot 205 T16, Lancia 037, MG 6R4, Lancia Delta S4, Porsche 959, and the Audi Quattro. Though not as popular in North America the series was huge in Europe, and thanks to DirtFish samples of many of these awesome cars were on display for us to enjoy between talks.

The other panelists included Becs Williams who has been the media face and brains of pro rallying in the world for over 20 years. She had zero interest in being the best woman sports commentator; she simply wanted to be the best sports the US Touring Car Championship, and Vanessa Ruck who races motorcycles as well as helps as a motivational speaker. Lastly, Jinda Erbacher shared stories about her life and driving a 10,000 bhp drag race car.

As the Alfa club, we enjoyed the event but with so many people in the crowd we rarely saw each other. Our host, Josie, served as emcee. keeping the event flowing smoothly.

The great take-away was that when we remove restrictions, it's amazing what people can do. This isn't a male or female thing, it's a human ability. Each of these people spoke about

their challenges, but each talked of the confidence and determination they acquired from seeing others achieve, or getting support from heroes like friends and family.

Be that hero or shero when you get that chance.

Breakfast with Jon

h, that Fred Russell really is like a box of chocolates; you never know what you're going to get. But whatever it is, it's always good.

On March 17 a group of 30 NWARC members and guests enjoyed a special treat provided by Fred and Jon Shirley. Our club knows Jon as a valued member, of course, but also for having one of the most prestigious car collections in the world, a collection that Jon has generously shared with us during numer-

ous open houses. As the caretaker of that collection Fred often shows up for club events in a stunning ride, courtesy of his mandate to exercise individual vehicles occasionally to make sure they remain roadworthy.

The savvy career decisions that enabled Jon Shirley to indulge his automotive pas-

sions also allowed him and his late wife Mary to pursue their interests in art to perhaps an even greater degree. In fact, he bought his first collector Ferrari the same year they acquired their first Calder piece!

Jon joined us in the SAM boardroom on Sunday morning to share the story behind this incredible gift to the museum, recently installed in a spacious 2-story galley at the downtown branch. Jon's second wife Kim, a long time SAM trustee, shares her husband's philanthropic commitment and was instrumental in bringing the Calder exhibit to fruition.







In 1998, after amassing an impressive and diverse collection of art, the Shirleys decided to focus on acquiring a targeted museum-level collection that could eventually become a permanent destination exhibit for the Seattle Art Museum. They fairly quickly settled on expanding upon their beloved collection of works by the American artist Alexander Calder. Once that decision was made, they trekked to several Calder collections around the world, visited galleries that represented works by the artist and became acquainted with the artist's grandson, who runs the Calder Foundation. Word got out and Jon became a



preferred contact when Calder pieces became available.

As well as being an avid art collector, Jon also served on the board of the Seattle Art Museum for many years. He was the board chair when the Russell Investment company offered to buv SAM's downtown block in exchange for build-

ing several floors for the museum at the base of their new tower, and developing the Venturi Scott Brown-designed addition.

As if that wasn't enough, at the same time Jon spearheaded the development of the museum's Olympic Sculpture Park. The Shirleys provided the seed money

to purchase the old Unocal property north of Pier 70 and sweetened the deal by gifting several large art pieces, including Calder's sculpture "*The Eagle*". The timing proved fortuitous in one aspect; the material excavated for the tower foundation and parking garage downtown was used to fill and grade the sculpture park site, saving the projects several hundred thousand dollars in dirt management.

After the private talk Jon led us through the new "Calder: In

Motion" exhibit at the museum, sharing personal anecdotes about many of the pieces; where he found them, how they fit into the arc of the artist's life, what it took to transport and install them, and so on.


Many of us were familiar with Calder's work in general and have seen photos of some of the more well-known pieces before, but there's something utterly



absorbing about seeing them in real life. The mobiles are so exquisitely balanced that they freely rotate with only the light air movement from the museum's standard a/c system; they're different every time you look at them. The shadow play from



the cleverly lighted pieces is as fascinating as the art work itself, and Jon



explained that this was a big part of the artist's intent and a focus of the museum staff as they designed the exhibit.

Calder created more than mobiles, of course, as witness *"The Eagle"* on Seattle's waterfront and several other static



pieces. New to many of us, though, were his small works, only a few inches high, and his ability to capture the essence of a human or an animal with a single piece of wire.

Jon was a fascinating and gracious host. It was an absolute delight to listen to him talk about an artist so close to his heart, and how meaningful it is for him to open this exhibit now as a significant contribution to the puzzle of revitalizing the downtown core of the city he loves.

SPICA Today

ne of the more intriguing aspects of our classic Alfas has, to me, always been their SPICA mechanical fuel injection system.

Introduced in 1969 to comply with the USA's latest emissions regulations, it was fitted only to Alfas, and almost exclusively only to Alfas sent to the USA.

Fuel injection wasn't a new concept; it was first patented in 1872, Rudolf Diesel adapted it for his diesel engine in 1894 and most aero engines during WW2 were injected. All these were mechanical systems and their potential for generating higher performance through better fuel atomization and more precise delivery also led to their use in racing cars (Mercedes-Benz, Corvettes, Alfas)

and high-end road cars (MB again, Maserati, high-end BMW 2002s and Porsche 911s).

Introducing them to a full range of road cars, however, meant also exposing them to the full range of auto technicians across the country. It wasn't that the SPICA system was complex - so are carburetors - but that it was different. It developed a reputation for being finicky and unreliable, but that was almost entirely due to it being maladjusted by well-meaning but inexperi-

enced technicians.

Its principal drawback was that, as a precision device made of very high-quality materials and built to very exacting stand-

> ards, it was expensive to manufacture, and when electricallycontrolled systems became available at lower cost, Alfa quickly adopted them.

So when I came across Harry White's 1975 Spider at the AROC Winter Retreat in February, I was intrigued to see that it had a much more modern Alfa Twin Spark engine fitted, but with a SPICA system replacing its standard electronic injection! Could it be that SPICA still had advantages today?

This of course led me to talk to Wes Ingram, who'd done the conversion, and I began to learn more about these fascinating devices. I'll cover our discussions in future articles, but for now I'll just quote Wes: "After restoring over 4,000 Spica pumps we have learned so much, and we now find that they are far better than anyone ever realized when they were presented to America in 1969." More next month.

Rico Chiarelli


he Pacific Northwest Ballet hosted a Celebration of Life for Alfa Club member Rico Chiarelli on Sunday, March 24, 2024.






